This means we can continue to focus on what is essential – to support the congregations of this Presbytery - and to be Missional, Pastoral and Prophetic in a world that so desperately needs the Good News of Jesus Christ.

Dear Clerks of Session and Other Church Leaders,



I am frequently asked the following question: Can National Capital Presbytery provide officer training for its churches?

This year the answer is YES!!!! Black Presbyterians United and the National Capital Presbytery are cosponsoring Leadership Training Day on Saturday, November 10, 2018, from 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. This will be an opportunity for elders, deacons, clerks, stewardship chairs, treasurers, and other church leaders to hear from experts, get answers to their questions, and get ideas from other leaders in our presbytery's churches. This is a wonderful opportunity for your current leaders and for those coming on to your boards next year.

The offerings include a <u>Stewardship</u> session given by Elder Olanda Carr, who is the East Region Ministry Relations Officer at the Presbyterian Foundation. Elder Carr coaches finance, stewardship, and endowment committees and works with congregations to develop gifts and fundraising plans.

There will be a session on <u>Church Development and Mission</u> given by the Rev. Karen Chamis, NCP's Director of Church Development and Mission. Among other things, she will have information on NCP's mission grant offerings.

Rev. Leslianne Braunstein, head of NCP's Sexual Misconduct Response Team, will speak on <u>Healthy Boundaries</u> for Leaders. All Sessions are required to have in place a sexual misconduct policy and a child protection policy. And some churches have the misfortune of having an instance of sexual misconduct in their congregation. Rev. Braunstein can provide information on policies, explain exactly what sexual misconduct and sexual abuse are, and teach leaders how to maintain healthy boundaries in the church.

Church leaders involved with communication and evangelism will want to hear Mrs. LaJuan Quander, NCP's Director of <u>Communications</u>, speak about NCP's methods of communication and learn about the importance of social media in church communications.

I will provide <u>Officer Training</u> for current and future elders and deacons as well as some training for clerks. There will be other offerings including, but not limited to, plain talk on the generational divide.

There will be Worship led by the Rev. Juan Guthrie, pastor of Sargent Memorial.

Finally, the Stated Clerk of the PCUSA, the Rev. Dr. J. Herbert Nelson, is coming from PCUSA headquarters in Louisville, KY, for this event to speak on <u>Transformative Leadership</u>. If you haven't heard him, you should know that he is a compelling speaker.

Continental breakfast and lunch will be served. Registration is required by November 7. The event is at Sargent Memorial Presbyterian Church, an historic African American Church that traces its roots to 1908. It is the home of the incredible Sargent Memorial Gospel-Aires, who have led music at several of our presbytery meetings. It is located at 5109 Nannie Helen Burroughs Avenue, N.E., Washington, D.C. Clerks' Tip of the Month Creating Safe Ministries



One advantage of belonging to a connectional church is the opportunity to share resources. A very useful resource from the Presbyterian Mission Agency is their webpage on "Creating Safe Ministries": <u>https://www.presbyterianmission.org/legal-resources/creating-safe-ministries</u>.

The site contains guidance on such matters as reporting abuse or misconduct, creating the required sexual misconduct and child and youth protection policies, and rebuilding trust in a congregation after an incident of sexual misconduct. It lists suggestions for what should be in the policies and lists some prevention techniques. It has ideas about training. It also contains information on something our congregations, sadly, are beginning to think about: developing an emergency plan for violence on church property.

The information on emergency plans includes ideas for who should work on the plan in a congregation, sources of guidance including, e.g., a link to the Federal Emergency Management Administration's "Guide for Developing High-Quality Emergency Operations Plans for Houses of Worship," and issues to consider in developing such a plan. It also covers who should be trained on the plan and who should have copies of the plan.

While you are on the webpage, you might consider exploring the PMA website a little more. Interested in hunger and poverty, racial equity, disaster response, advocacy? Check the "What We Do" tab at the top of the page. There is a "Get Involved" tab that has, for example, tips for conducting mission trips and a way to become involved with Presbyterian Disaster Assistance.

I am glad I am a Presbyterian, but I know I am speaking to the choir.

Jeffrey C. Pugh, Professor Emeritus and Distinguished University Professor at Elon University, is author of six books, He has spent much of his career exploring why Christianity failed so tragically in Germany during the rise of National Socialism and the ensuing Holocaust.




NCP Confronting Racism Task Force Listening Project Open Space November 27, 2018, January 22, 2019, and March 26, 2019

The NCP Confronting Racism Task Force is beginning phase II of its three-phase process, which ends with three or four strong recommendations to Leadership Council to address the Presbytery's five-year Mission emphasis to "Bear public witness to the love, truth, and justice of God in Jesus Christ specifically in the areas of racism and reconciliation," by listening first to each of our own congregations, and following to listen as broadly as possible throughout the Presbytery at three opportunities offered at Open Spaces at each of the next three stated meetings in November, January, and March, and listening to our elders at retirement centers throughout National Capital Presbytery.

Our sessions will consist of a focus group of 10-12 members, facilitated and recorded by two members of the NCP Confronting Racism Task Force. If you are interested in participating in one of these listening sessions, please show up on time (4:00PM) at one of the three Open Spaces listed above. We will accept the first 10-12 persons, creating the most diverse group possible. Please arrive having considered the following four questions:

1)As a child, what have you heard adults around you say about people of other races?2)What are your basic thoughts/beliefs about people who are a different race than you?3)How does your faith impact how you understand race?4)What has been your experience of race in the church?
