How do we measure success in ministry when the traditional metrics of membership, attendance, and financial support seem out of touch with the realities of our post-Christendom contexts? Cultivated Ministry is a culture shift and approach to ministry that is committed to rigorous assessment, evaluation, and (re)design aimed at nurturing thoughtful expressions of God's mission in the world. It does not rest on traditional metrics, nor does it abdicate accountability. This training will give participants an overview of the four interlocking components of Cultivated Ministry: Theology of Bearing Fruit, Mutual Accountability, Assessment for Learning, and Transformative Storytelling.

John Vest is the Visiting Assistant Professor of Evangelism at Union Presbyterian Seminary and served on the task force that developed the Cultivated Ministry resource with NEXT Church.



Bonhoeffer in Charlottesville: Pondering the Shape of America

Dietrich Bonhoeffer, famous German theologian and Nazi resister, is an example for American Christians of a faith-based response to the threat of Nazism and the white supremacy movement. For many, Bonhoeffer's act of resistance was thought to be a thing of the past but recent events in the life of our country prove otherwise. What happens when the Nazis show up in chat rooms, websites, and finally, on your city streets? How are Christians to respond when the same ideologies that tore apart Germany find approval in America's civic and political life? On Saturday November 3rd at Capitol Hill Presbyterian Church in Washington, DC, Jeffrey C. Pugh, former Maude Sharpe Powell Professor of Religious Studies and Distinguished University Professor at Elon University will lead a discussion of these questions as he recounts his experiences of August 11/12th in Charlottesville, Va. as part of the clergy resistance. He will discuss how Christianity contributed to the rise of Nazism, ineffectively resisted it, and how faith might inform our choices moving forward in America.

Jeffrey C. Pugh, Professor Emeritus and Distinguished University Professor at Elon University, is author of six books, He has spent much of his career exploring why Christianity failed so tragically in Germany during the rise of National Socialism and the ensuing Holocaust.

Katharine Hayhoe, Ph.D.

is an accomplished atmospheric pressing issues facing humanity today: climate change and why it matters to us here and now. She is also a remarkable communicator. But Katharine may be best-known to many people because of how she's bridging the broad, deep gap between scientists and Christianswork she does in part because she's a Christian herself. She's been recognized by Time Magazine as one of the top 100 Most Influential People in the world (2014) and by Foreign Policy as one of the top 100 Global Thinkers: her work was featured on the Emmy award-winning documentary series, The Years of Living Dangerously; and she won the American Geophysical Union's award for climate communication. She was named to the POLITICO 50 list of thinkers, doers and visionaries transforming American politics (2016) and named one of FORTUNE's world's greatest leaders (2017).






NCP Confronting Racism Task Force Listening Project Open Space November 27, 2018, January 22, 2019, and March 26, 2019

The NCP Confronting Racism Task Force is beginning phase II of its three-phase process, which ends with three or four strong recommendations to Leadership Council to address the Presbytery's five-year Mission emphasis to "Bear public witness to the love, truth, and justice of God in Jesus Christ specifically in the areas of racism and reconciliation," by listening first to each of our own congregations, and following to listen as broadly as possible throughout the Presbytery at three opportunities offered at Open Spaces at each of the next three stated meetings in November, January, and March, and listening to our elders at retirement centers throughout National Capital Presbytery.

Our sessions will consist of a focus group of 10-12 members, facilitated and recorded by two members of the NCP Confronting Racism Task Force. If you are interested in participating in one of these listening sessions, please show up on time (4:00PM) at one of the three Open Spaces listed above. We will accept the first 10-12 persons, creating the most diverse group possible. Please arrive having considered the following four questions:

1)As a child, what have you heard adults around you say about people of other races?2)What are your basic thoughts/beliefs about people who are a different race than you?3)How does your faith impact how you understand race?4)What has been your experience of race in the church?
