Dear Saints,

Fourteen years and seven months ago I came to my dream job.

Here.



Ever since the early 1980's I had felt the pull of God's call to this work. And I have loved it. And I have loved you and will continue to love you, but from an appropriate distance. I will miss the work, but most of all I will miss the remarkable relationships I have shared with you over the years. Thank you for being the best Presbytery ever.

Next month I join the list of former General Presbyters who have served this Presbytery over the years:

Ralph Merker was the first full time Washington City Presbytery staff person; his title was" Superintendent of Missions," then General Presbyter from 1943 to 1958, a tenure slightly longer than mine. Toward the end of this time Charles Carson was employed as Church Development specialist and so began a dynamic period for new church development, much of it funded by the sale of closed urban churches. In 1956 the per capita leapt from 13 cents to 55 cents to fund much of this growth. During this time the Presbytery was active in refugee resettlement, especially Hungarians fleeing the violence of the 1956 revolution. Also, in 1956 this Presbytery was the home of Margaret Towner, who was the first woman ordained a teaching elder, albeit to a call in New York. These presbyteries were the first to elect women as General Assembly commissioners.

Kirk Hammond was employed by Potomac Presbytery as Superintendent of Home Missions in 1948 and charged with developing new churches. The title "Executive" was deemed too akin to "Bishop." Over a ten-year period, the Presbytery established 13 different new congregations. The Presbytery more than doubled in size.

In Washington City Presbytery Arthur Romig, over saw the start of about a dozen churches through the 1960s. He worked closely with the relocation of the National Presbyterian Church. The Presbytery was a significant voice advocating for the Confession of 1967. The Presbytery also was a constant supporter of immigrant rights and civil rights.

In 1967 the Presbytery called Ed White as Urban Ministry Specialist. His first action was to lend support to the Poor People's campaign which I attended as a high school sophomore from Arkansas.

Jim Ficklin, the new "Executive Secretary" of Potomac Presbytery managed a painful six-year conflict with Second Alexandria and tended to all the complexities of the formation of National Capital Union Presbytery which united the former southern and northern streams. The Potomac Presbytery had petitioned the GA for reunion of these northern and southern

branches in 1947 and again in 1955. He brought the Potomac Presbytery to the edge of the Presbytery union but retired with failing health.

Grayde McClelland, Executive in Washington City, became the interim General Presbyter of this Union Presbytery and along with Ed White, ironed out the considerable details of the union of the two Presbyteries which did not have exactly over lying boundaries. In 1971 the two Presbyteries united as one "union" presbytery with standing in both the UPCUSA and the PCUS.

Ed White succeeded McClelland as General Presbyter and served from 1972 until 1988, cleaned up behind the disastrously expensive Landmark Shopping Center adventure, expanded the staff to 22 people, and developed a robust programmatic presbytery with Mission relationships in Kenya and Korea. Numerous Korean Churches were started. Refugee ministries, Civil Rights, Social justice, Affordable Housing, the Pilgrimage and Washington Center were among the initiatives of this age.

In the 1990's General Presbyter Teri Thomas, worked to respond to an epidemic of sexual misconduct cases and oversaw the painful task of reducing the size of the staff moving from a program staffing philosophy to a resource staffing philosophy. More immigrant congregations found their start. The Presbytery continued its robust church development system with the leadership of Ann Philbrick.

We all have benefited from the accomplishments of the saints that preceded us here. I have not forgotten the legacy of excellent Executive leadership, which is largely unknown. While you might know Ed White and Terry Thomas, I wager few of you have heard the names of Ficklin, McClelland, Hammond, Romig and Merker. Largely our service is quiet and so is our memory. Next month I pass into anonymity in good company.

We have had our bumps. We lost \$20 million dollars on the ill-advised arbitrage decisions on Meadowkirk. The same ill-advised arbitrage strategy led to Covenant Manassas losing its property and the Presbytery losing an additional \$2 Million. Out of these tragedies were born a robust comprehensive Financial Policy and written criteria for church encumbrances. We have seen three churches leave our communion to the ECO and the EPC. We have suffered a few more sexual misconduct cases, but only one since we began requiring training every three years. We negotiated a few pastoral departures. We grieved the passing of pastors into the church triumphant. We have also celebrated the ministries of five congregations which have been closed.

We have shared some highlights as well. Over my time with you we have constituted the Prince George Community PC, the Brambleton Presbyterian Church, The Rock, and Christ the King PC. This Presbytery initiated the action of the General Assembly to include the Belhar Confession in our Book of Confessions.

We endorsed and secured General Assembly endorsement of a significant paper on Muslim Christian Relations, "A Common Word between Us and You".

This Presbytery advocated for Book of Order changes allowing pastors and churches to conduct same gender weddings. And also, this Presbytery endorsed the Authoritative Interpretation insuring that those churches who choose not to conduct same gender weddings could follow their consciences. We have enjoyed three General Assembly moderators and one vice moderator over my time with you.

There is much that Presbytery Executives do which is unseen: When we say no to the consideration of this problematic pastor, when we say no to the excessive church loan, when we coach conflicted parties toward reconciliation, when we protect a pastor's spiritual authority, when we bring a gift to increase the capacity of a pastor to serve, when we listen to the pain and the confusion so many people feel in this present Church Reformation.

We have revisited our mission statement and emphases four times, tweaked our structure twice, shifted our staff design twice, welcomed and dismissed dozens of pastors. We have written financial policies, a Manual of Administrative Operations, an ACCP Manual. We have ventured into creative land use with three congregations now.

I need not point out that the Church of Jesus Christ is in the midst of a Reformation. Old patterns are done, new patterns are emerging, support sources are shifting, the shape of public faith is reconfigured. Idolatry takes on new and devious forms. The work demands that each of us be continuously discerning and retooling for whatever God has coming our way. There is pain in the loss of familiar forms but promise in God's future. I trust I may have served you well and prepared you in part for the future into which you will travel with your next Presbytery leader. It has been my joy in this time to serve as your General Presbyter. Thank you.

The National Capital Presbytery met on September 25, 2018 at National Presbyterian Church. During the meeting, National Capital Presbytery, led by Moderator Rev. Dr. Quinn Fox:

- Gathered around the theme "Dismantling Racism."
- Watched the liturgical dance "Break Every Chain" by the Darryl M. Gross Memorial Dance Ministry.
- Learned of transitions in National Capital Presbytery and welcomed new Ministers of Word and Sacrament Gloria Yi, Christine Ford, Andrew Tsai, and Aaron Nagel.
- Celebrated the ministry of the Rev. Dr. Wilson Gunn as General Presbyter of National Capital Presbytery.
- Appreciated music supplied by the amazing Sargent Memorial Gospelaires.
- Approved the 2019 Operating Budget of \$1,094,498, which includes an increase in the combined per capita rate from \$39.91 to \$41.73. \$31.93 of the \$41.73 goes to National Capital Presbytery.
- Received the 2019 Mission Budget of \$951,563 for First Reading.
- Approved formation of an Administrative Commission for Wheaton Community Presbyterian Church to assist that church in electing a session.
- Approved the call of the Rev. Scott Ramsey as Pastor/Head of Staff of Lewinsville Presbyterian Church.
- Approved the 2019 Compensation Policy.
- Approved the Interfaith Conference of Metropolitan Washington Statement on Racism.
- Approved the dissolution of the Unity Presbyterian Church, Temple Hills, Maryland, effective December 31, 2018 and commended the session and members of Unity for their grace and faithfulness in making this difficult decision.
- Heard a sermon from Dr. Catherine Meeks "Building Inner and Outer Bridges."
- Celebrated the Lord's Supper which was administered by the Rev. Dr. Wilson Gunn, Jr. and the Rev. Elenora Giddings-Ivory.

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



On Saturday November 3rd at Capitol Hill Presbyterian Church in Washington, DC, Jeffrey C.
