Greetings!

Over these past two months I have had one-on-one meetings with over 50 leaders in our presbytery. We gathered around tables in coffee shops and restaurants and sat together in rooms and offices in churches throughout our presbytery. So many of you shared your joys and struggles of ministry. I heard so many of your stories about growing your church; wrestling with decline; ways to engage your congregations with evangelism and The Gospel; figuring out how to respond to tragic gun violence; building and equipping new leaders and disciples; dealing with the loss of beloved staff. Through all these stories there was one theme that seemed to emerge more often than not. That was the hunger for more collaboration. So many of you felt that you were out there doing it alone with little to no support from your colleagues. You were wondering if others in the presbytery were dealing with the same things that you were. And if they were, what were they doing about it.

We currently don't have the *best* platform to help build community throughout our presbytery, but we could easily make one. This might sound very elementary to some of you but hear me out. Let's do a better job of being intentional about building community when we gather as a body. This could be something as simple as introducing (or maybe reintroducing) yourself to someone in our presbytery that you don't know too well. Ask them what they are excited about in the life of their congregation. Have them share a recent "win" in ministry. And then, don't be shy, SHARE YOURS! You'll probably walk away from that conversation with a new college in ministry AND a new idea. It might seem like a small thing, but these are the first steps to building real and authentic relationships that will be the grounds on which we build whatever it is that will come next.

"Go ye therefore, into the presbytery and make new friends".

Clerk's Tip The 224th General Assembly is Coming!!!!



Although June 20, 2020, the opening day of the 224th General Assembly in Baltimore seems a long way off, there is a lot to do to get ready. Sessions in National Capital Presbytery who have overtures they wish to have considered at the General Assembly will have to write, adopt, and transmit them to me by certain due dates. The Bills & Overtures Committee will have to review each overture for form and substance and decide whether to make a recommendation to the presbytery that the overture be adopted. The presbytery will have to vote on each overture—and I will transmit approved overtures to the Office of the General Assembly.

But that is not all. Sessions that sponsor an overture will have to find one or more other presbyteries to concur with their overture. And sessions may also want to recommend that NCP concur with certain overtures adopted by other presbyteries.

The deadline for submitting to me (1) overtures amending the Book of Order, (2) overtures seeking an authoritative interpretation of the Book of Order, and (3) all requests for concurrences with other presbyteries' overtures amending the Book of Order or seeking an authoritative interpretation is <u>November 30, 2019</u>. These overtures will be voted on at the January 28, 2020 Presbytery meeting. I recommend that sessions strive to finalize their overtures well before that date to allow enough time to find concurring presbyteries.

The deadline for submitting all overtures and requests for concurrences other than those in the three categories listed above is <u>January 31, 2020</u>. They will be voted on at the March 24, 2020 Presbytery meeting.

Every General Assembly there are some churches who are disappointed because their overture came too late. The strict deadlines of the Office of General Assembly, the relatively new requirement that concurrences be obtained, and the presbytery meeting calendar require us to plan ahead. We have posted links to some helps regarding overtures and the General Assembly on presbytery home page: <u>www.thepresbytery.org</u>. Take a look.

One last thing. I get requests from time to time for samples of church **sexual misconduct policies and child protection policies**. If you have one you would be willing to share with a fellow NCP congregation, would you send it to me at <u>scoe@thepresbytery.org</u>. We are a connectional church!

Nomination of Commissioners to the 224th General Assembly National Capital Presbytery June 20-27, 2020 – Baltimore, MD

Grace and Peace, brothers and sisters of the National Capital Presbytery!

The General Assembly is coming to Baltimore next June! The Nominating Committee will be nominating a slate of ruling and teaching elders to become commissioners and a young adult to be an advisory delegate to the Assembly. We encourage all those eligible to consider applying for one of our slots.

Nomination forms for Teaching Elder, Ruling Elder Commissioners to the 224th General Assembly to be held in Baltimore, MD, June 20-27 are now available on the NCP website. You can access from the link provided or from the homepage, see **"224th GENERAL ASSEMBLY (2020)"**. There you can also find nomination forms for the Young Adult Advisory Delegates (YAADs). These forms can ONLY be submitted electronically. No paper copies will be accepted. Criteria for nominations from NCP to the General Assembly can be found <u>here</u>.

It is the mandate of the Presbytery to nominate commissioners who reflect the theological diversity as well as the social diversity that exists in our presbytery. The information provided on these forms helps the Nominating committee assure an appropriate balance of theological diversity; clergy and lay people; male and female; all ages; racial/ethnic groups; geographical area; and congregation sizes.

- All applications should be emailed to <u>nominating@thepresbytery.org</u>, attached as a word document or pdf. The file should be named [LAST NAME] GAapp. All candidates must also attach a picture. [LAST NAME] GApic
- Clergy may submit forms on their own. Letters of recommendation are not required but may be submitted if desired.
- Elders and those seeking to be YAADs will complete the form and send it electronically to their Clerk or Moderator of Session. The Clerk or Moderator shall complete and submit the form electronically after the Session has endorsed the nomination.
- At least one (and up to three) reference forms for Ruling Elders and YAADs are to be submitted electronically by the person writing the recommendation.

Transportation to the General Assembly, and room and board are reimbursed for commissioners and YAADS in accordance with General Assembly policy. A <u>Dependent Care</u> <u>Reimbursement Policy</u> was developed for commissioners and advisory delegates to the General Assembly – beginning with the 222nd GA (2016).

All forms are due by Saturday, September 28, 2019. The Nominating Committee will post the slate of commissioners and delegates online by October 29, 2019. Anyone who is not nominated at that point and wishes to be nominated from the floor must submit a completed form to the Presbytery office by November 5, two weeks before the November 19th presbytery meeting.

We anticipate a larger than usual number of applicants this year, so whether you are selected, we thank you for your willingness to serve the church in this special way.

Deadlines for Submission to the Bills and Overtures Committee of Overtures and Requests for Concurrences with Other Presbyteries' Overtures for the 224th General Assembly:

- a) <u>November 30, 2019</u> for
 - a. amendments to the Book of Order,
 - b. overtures seeking an authoritative interpretation of the Book of Order, and
 - c. all requests for concurrences with other presbyteries' overtures amending the Book of Order or seeking an authoritative interpretation.
- b) January 31, 2020 for all other overtures and for all requests for concurrences with other presbyteries' other overtures.



REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS

Healthy congregations are those that are missionally focused and stable in terms of resources (people as well as financial). They manage conflict, and continue to re-evaluate their internal and external contexts and adapt accordingly.

The Next Steps for Healthy Congregations Grant is one way in which National Capital Presbytery partners with its congregations, by providing matching funds of up to \$20,000 a year for congregations taking the next step in church growth by creating a new program or staff position.

To be considered for the Next Step Grant, churches must have completed the Congregational Assessment Tool and should be in the Transformational quadrant. More information about the grant and the process can be found at <u>www.ncptransforms.org</u> Proposals are due by November 15, 2019 for the 2020 fiscal year. These grants as well other grants from the Transformation Team of the Presbytery are available through Unified Mission Giving and the Resurrection Fund.

Dear Friends:

I composed this letter originally to be sent to McCormick Theological Seminary to mark the 50th anniversary of my ordination to the Ministry of Word and Sacrament on June 20, 1969, shortly after receiving my divinity degree from McCormick. I am happy to share this with all my fellows in ministry in NCP.

My career in ministry has been eventful and filled with change and surprise. After graduating from McCormick, I was called to the position of Assistant Director for the Arts at Market Place Ministries in Northern Virginia, to which I was ordained. Market Place Ministries was disbanded soon after, and I wrestled with whether to stay in ministry or go back to school in landscape design. I chose to stay in ministry and found a position as assistant pastor at Old First Presbyterian Church in Newark, New Jersey. After three years there I returned to the Washington, D.C., area and had a series of positions in Christian Education and leadership training. Then I was called to three years as assistant pastor at The New York Avenue Presbyterian Church in Washington. Part of these three years coincided with the period when Dr. Art McKay, president at McCormick during my years there, was interim pastor.

I then decided to attend Catholic University to work toward a Master's in Social Work, which I received in May of 1980. After working as a psychotherapist and management trainer, I felt called back to ministry. I began working in 1983 at the Falls Church Presbyterian Church in Virginia as an interim assistant minister, and then for a period as Interim Associate for Mission and Witness for NCP, where I worked with LaJuan Quander. The Rev. Ed White was Presbytery Executive at that time. I also continued to see clients in my developing counseling-psychotherapy practice.

Then, as the AIDS crisis emerged in the 1980s, I sought ways to be more involved helping persons with HIV. I was offered a position in 1986 as a social worker in the growing AIDS Services Program at the Whitman-Walker Clinic in Washington, D.C. And then after a year as one of the social workers, I became Director of AIDS Services at Whitman-Walker. And after three difficult years, left that position very burned out.

I returned to full-time private practice in 1989, and soon realized that the kind of counseling I was practicing is called pastoral counseling. In 1998, I joined the Centers for Pastoral Counseling of Virginia and saw clients as part of that group until I retired in March 2008. Over these years I maintained my connection with The Falls Church Presbyterian Church as a parish associate, and I am still there today.

I am a gay man and coming to acceptance of myself and my gifts has been part of my journey in ministry. There were several men at McCormick who were very instrumental in my progress toward self-acceptance. And coming out in the church has been part of my journey as well. The people at Falls Church Presbyterian have been accepting of and celebrating my full humanity from the very first of our ministry together in 1983. I am extremely grateful for them and for Ed, my partner since 1984 and husband since 2015.



And she is someone who always welcomes a new book suggestion! James B. seeks to work with the community to live into our call to do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with Jesus. Before Union, James B. spent seasons in college, youth, adult, and new ministries, at First Presbyterian Ann Arbor (MI), and First Presbyterian Church and University Presbyterian Church in Seattle (WA). James B. is continually being schooled by his three kids, adding to the education he received at Princeton Theological Seminary. A native of Seattle he loves the rain but increasingly appreciates how sunshine makes biking and tennis more enjoyable. **Union** is located in a section of downtown Seattle where 36,000 people work and live! After exegeting the neighborhood, they decided that what was most needed was a space offering a café (serving coffee during the day, and beer and wine in the evenings!) and a events venue. The desire was to create a space where people, from residents of low-income housing to employees at Amazon, could work, connect, and simply mingle! The church community would share the space, but the building would NOT be called a church.

The **Rhythm** of worship at Union is understood to be a life lived in response to God's love for all and with passion for justice and reconciliation. The community works hard to expand peoples' imagination with regard to ministry: more traditionally thru music, prayer, and Scripture, but also through loving and serving others in partnership with the Holy Spirit. For that reason, every Sunday at Union is a little different! They are in a rhythm that reinforces a broad experience of worship.



Ted Wardlaw

President, Austin Theological Seminary "Navigating between 'Amen' and 'No': The Dilemma and Promise of The Presbyterian Outlook"

A native of South Carolina, Wardlaw is a graduate of Presbyterian College. He earned his divinity degree at Union Theological Seminary in Virginia (now Union Presbyterian Seminary). At Union, he won a graduate fellowship to continue his studies at Yale University Divinity School, where he earned a Masters of Sacred Theology in American

Church History (Magna Cum Laude). He was awarded the honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree by his alma mater, Presbyterian College, in 2007.

President Wardlaw led Austin Seminary through the completion of the Centennial Campaign, and he has led additional capital campaigns raising more than \$60 million to date. Under his leadership, the seminary has funded the construction of two four-story apartment buildings for students and has plans to renovate and expand a library and Learning Information Center. He preaches and teaches widely across the country and has contributed to a number of edited books and has written numerous articles for such periodicals as *The Christian Century, Journal for Preachers, Call to Worship*, and *The Presbyterian Outlook*.



Brian K. Blount President, Union Presbyterian Seminary "Flesh in the Word: A Presbyterian Outlook for Our Time"

Blount was called to Union Presbyterian Seminary in 2007, after serving for 15 years as the Richard J. Dearborn Professor of New Testament Interpretation at Princeton Theological Seminary. An M.Div. graduate of Princeton Seminary, he obtained his B.A. from the College of William and Mary. He was William and Mary's first African -American to receive membership in the Alpha Chapter of the Phi Beta

Kappa Honor Society. He received his Ph.D. in New Testament Studies from Emory University.

His primary work has been in the Gospel of Mark, the Book of Revelation and in the area of cultural studies and hermeneutics. He is the author of six books. His most recent work, *Invasion of the Dead: Preaching Resurrection*, is based on his 2011 Yale Beecher Lectures. In 2010, his Revelation commentary was voted the 2009 top reference work by the Academy of Parish Clergy.

Blount is an editor of The Discipleship Study Bible, by Westminster John Knox (2008). As a part of his work for the Bible, he has written the introduction and notes for Mark and Matthew. He is an associate editor of the *New Interpreter's Dictionary of the Bible* for Abingdon Press and the general editor for *True To Our Native Land: An African American New Testament Commentary* by Fortress Press.
