Greetings!

I had visions of grandeur about how I was going to use my paternity leave. Of course I was going to bond with my newborn son, which I did, but I was also going to finish a bunch of projects around the house, catch up on some reading, and pick up a new hobby; all while having an infant strapped to my chest while my brain was operating on 3 hour intervals of sleep. Needless to say, all those things didn't happen. I got one and half of them done. I bonded with Otis and I attempted a new hobby during my last week.

I want to start baking bread at home. Which means I needed to create a "starter" for my bread making (and that's currently how far I've gotten). In my head, bread making was a long and complicated process. I thought I was going to need to get a long list of supplies and equipment to pull this off. Turns out that's not the case. Bread, in its the truest form, is only 3 ingredients.

Flour, salt, and water. That's it!

With those three ingredients plus a little time, exposure to air; the bacteria that's all around us, and heat, you can transform elements that by themselves cannot sustain life to something that can not only sustain life but can feed a community.

Over the years we found it easier and more profitable to take some short cuts in our bread making. We replaced time with manufactured ingredients to speed up the process and allow a longer shelf-life. This process then created unforeseen problems in the way people digest something that we as humanity haven't had a problem with for thousands of years. We over complicated something that initially was very simple.

This is also true in our work as *The Church*. It can seem daunting and complicated. We think we don't have the right equipment. All the things we've added over the years, thinking it would help, has only created more problems.

We too have been given a list of simple ingredients like building community through discipleship; living out The Gospel in everything we do; and rooting ourselves in love. If we do those few things, let them get exposed to the air/wind/Spirt and voila... you have *The Church*.

It's amazing how something as simple as flour, water, and salt can transform and multiply in size with a little time and trust. Let's do the same with the things given to us from God for the glory of the church.

Arlington Presbyterian Church returns home in a new configuration at Gilliam Place

Arlington, Virginia, November 19, 2019—On Sunday, November 17, Arlington Presbyterian Church (APC) celebrated their homecoming. APC returned to their former site opening a new worship, office and multiuse space on the ground-floor of Gilliam Place, a 173-unit affordable housing community developed by the Arlington Partnership for Affordable Housing (APAH) along Columbia Pike.

APC's move back to their former property where they worshipped for over a century, completes an 8-year journey for their congregation in discerning new ways they might be called to be church in the community. After their bold decision to sell their existing church building and property to APAH for the development of affordable housing in 2014, the congregation returned to lease a portion of the ground-floor retail space from APAH in the completed building. "APC's new worship space is a communal, Spirit-filled gathering area that



invites participation, creativity, and equality for the sake of South Arlington," said Pastor Ashley Goff. The brand-new multi-use building is named in honor of Ronda A. Gilliam, APC's first African-American elder, a community leader and clothing ministry founder.

In the spring of 2017, APC purchased back from APAH two single-family home lots preserving open space for the neighborhood. APC is committed to using this space as gathering, garden and prayer space available for all the neighbors to use. "We were called to create a sacred green space for our neighbors and our community. Our garden is an evolving landscape. **Our desire is to offer this garden as a place of restoration: a place where life, people, and native plants can find stillness, peace, and healing," said Susan Etherton, Elder.**

APC also looks forward to strengthening their support of La Cocina VA, a nonprofit, bilingual culinary training program for low-income individuals, who will move in next door to APC on the ground floor of Gilliam Place. "We discovered in La Cocina, a like-hearted, mission-oriented non-profit who along with us desires South Arlington to be a place of zero barriers to justice and equality. We're excited to grow alongside them," said Susan Etherton.

For over 100 years, Arlington Presbyterian Church has been a place where people of vision, connected with the community, have heard and responded to the needs of our neighbors along Columbia Pike. Arlington Presbyterian Church is also a More Light congregation working towards the full participation of LGBTQIA+ people in the life, ministry, and witness of the Presbyterian Church (USA) -- and in society. "I have come to see with greater and greater clarity that a blessing is at its most potent in times of disaster, devastation, and loss. When God's providence seems most difficult to find, a blessing helps us perceive the grace that threads through our lives. A blessing does not explain away our loss or justify devastation. It does not make light of grief or provide a simple fix for the rending. It does not compel us to 'move on'. Instead, a blessing meets us in the place of our deepest loss. In that place, it offers us a glimpse of wholeness and claims that wholeness here and now. **A blessing helps us to keep breathing—to abide this moment, and the next moment, and the one after that**".
