

#### Dear Friends,

Joy... is not a word I associate with Lent. The ringing alleluias and bright decorations of Easter call joy to mind more easily than does this season patterned on Jesus' fasting and prayer in the wilderness. We might take on typical Lenten practices like study, self-denial, or acts of mercy in a serious or even hopeful spirit, but joy? Still, when someone like Dietrich Bonhoeffer describes discipleship as joy, you pay attention.

The *Book of Order* has a lot to say about how we organize and govern ourselves as Presbyterians. But before it sets forth any governing structures, it lays a foundation of what it means to be part of the church: "Membership in the Church of Jesus Christ is a *joy* and a privilege" (G-1.0304, there's that word!). It then offers this rich and challenging description of what it means to take part in God's mission through this community of believers:

- proclaiming the good news in word and deed,
- taking part in the common life and worship of a congregation,
- lifting one another up in prayer, mutual concern, and active support,
- studying Scripture and the issues of Christian faith and life,
- supporting the ministry of the church through the giving of money, time, and talents,
- demonstrating a new quality of life within and through the church,
- responding to God's activity in the world through service to others,

- living responsibly in the personal, family, vocational, political, cultural, and social relationships of life,
- working in the world for peace, justice, freedom, and human fulfillment, caring for God's creation,
- participating in the governing responsibilities of the church, and
- reviewing and regularly evaluating the integrity of one's membership and considering ways in which one's participation in the worship and service of the church may be increased and made more meaningful.

As you consider all the ways of serving God, which of these inspires *joy* in you? I invite you, in this Lenten season, to pray and discern over where God may be calling you to deepen your joy and your commitment as a disciple of Jesus.

Greetings People,

P-Y-C, Pretty Young Christians? Not exactly... **PRESBYTERIAN YOUTH CONNECTION** is what used to be in existence throughout the denomination and in our Presbytery. It has been gone...UNTIL NOW, we hope. At least for National Capital Presbytery. NCP – Y – C, **NCPresbytery Youth Connection!** 



This past weekend, NCP youth from ten different congregations in our presbytery gathered at The Claggett Center for a Confirmation Retreat. Rev. John Molina-Moore and leadership from the Reformed Institute taught, supported, and connected a beautiful band of Presbyterians! Thank you to all the volunteer leaders, youth ministry staff and pastors who nurtured an impactful weekend.

I was struck by a running theme I heard from young and older attendees, "it is really important and good for me to be here because I am getting out of my bubble." I witnessed youth sharing, "I never have met other presbyterian youth from other parts of the DMV (DC, Maryland and Virginia congregations were present). I also heard, "I do not feel comfortable talking to other people outside of my family and my own church, but I am able to trust talking here." And a youth minister shared, "I started working with

this congregation during Covid so I just have not met other leaders from other presbyterian churches" . . .the bubble bursting can go on and on.

A few different reports are coming out that youth and children did lose aspects of emotional and other forms of developmental growth, including faith formation, during the lock-down realities of the pandemic. What we have relied upon for a personal faith development being in person could not happen. As a Presbytery we did lean into ways to stay connected **AND STILL** we must accept what was lost. To repair the breach, close the gap, heal the wound, we are cultivating intentional IN-Person gatherings and Events to nurture our faith formation and development, for us adults. WE



also need to cultivate renewal community shared space with our youth across our congregations and with one another. Did you know that some of our largest and growing-est youth programs are at Solo Pastor or Part-Time pastor led churches? They deserve a connected Presbytery, that is us!

Along with leaders from the Spiritual Formation Team, Church Development Committee, and Black Presbyterians United, we are doing a revival of NCP-Y-C! Look for upcoming announcements for regional small group gatherings with our youth, volunteer youth leadership development events, and youth retreats.


