- hear and act on the reports of our committees, commissions, and officers.

Don't forget to join **the conversation around two proposed amendments (POL01 - began as Olympia Overture) to the Book of Order**, taking place at National Presbyterian Church on the same day, September 24, at 3:00 p.m. Please have a look at the last edition of the Thursday Mail for more information about this gathering.

I am also looking forward to **our second annual presbytery-wide installation service** at Gaithersburg Presbyterian Church on October 19 at 3:00 p.m., celebrating the individual calls of new pastors while giving thanks for the gift of shared ministry. The Rev. Jihyun Oh, Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, will be our preacher, and we will be led in praise by a presbytery choir. Come and help us complete the call process as we install these new pastors in an enthusiastic and energetic service of worship.

From the Desk of Rev. Tara Spuhler McCabe Director of Congregational Development and Mission September 12, 2024



Greetings People,

This summer I participated in Wind-Down Wednesdays at the National Cathedral in Washington, DC. I admit it, I first thought I heard wine-down Wednesday. There was no wine. There were spiritual encounters throughout the Cathedral that was open to the public (for a small entrance fee). I hope to share more formally what this whole experience was like but for now, I was deeply moved by how the Cathedral was able to take advantage of their strengths and cultivate an evening for four weeks straight so that ANYONE could engage in spiritual practices as a community. We all started out as strangers and in our breath came together as one. It was attended very well (and they made some money)!

My biggest take-a-way is that each congregation DESERVES to stretch with their STRENGTHS by cultivating "warm friendly encounters." (This is the top ministry recommendation out of MissionInsite – American Beliefs Study). Your Presbytery, the Equipping Congregations Committee, and my desk have the resources you can utilize so that your congregations can grow…in spirit, in practice, in discipleship, and in membership.

Grants have been utilized to strengthen the impact of our congregations in Northern Virginia as a community through Virginians Organized for Interfaith Community Engagement (aka <u>VOICE</u>). Their collective actions and witness are deepening the supports needed to curtail the teen mental health crisis we are in the midst of today (see Act on Addiction Summit flyer in this TM).

Grants have been utilized to support Geneva Presbyterian Church as they strengthened a playground ministry to welcome families with children of differing abilities into the church and connect to outside organizations as safe spaces that can build up trust and faith! These grants did not only come out of a good idea. They have been organized, practiced, and discerned out of authentic strengths within each congregation.

Whether it is Wind-Down or Wind-Up, the resources are available to support your leadership to stretch with your STRENGTHS: small, medium, and big. You deserve to be energized as leaders in our churches so that you are able to encounter the amazing presence of Jesus Christ and invite others to join you! Take advantage of the Ministry Incubator sessions. Look for the upcoming webinars on Congregational Vitality. Most importantly join us in-person at our upcoming Presbytery Meeting as we engage with one another on prayer, discussion, and discernment.



Global Mission Network Partnership Grants Proposals Deadline



The Global Mission Network (GMN) is soliciting applications for the National Capital Presbytery (NCP) **Global Partnership Grants** program from congregations for new cooperative initiatives between congregations and their global mission partners. **The next deadline for grant applications is September 30, 2024.**

The program supports interactive, hands-on global mission projects with impact on the community. Preference will be given to new initiatives; applications may be submitted for continued funding in years two and three of a given project. Some preliminary work should be done to assess feasibility before applying, so that the project has a reasonable chance of success and some way to measure when success has been attained. Priority will be given to projects where there is an established relationship and a high level of confidence in the incountry team and where there is a plan for project sustainability. Projects with Presbyterian ecumenical partners are encouraged, but this is not a requirement.

This is a matching grant program; the contribution of your congregation toward the project in both money and labor will be considered. A congregation may submit only one application each year. Travel costs will not be considered, nor will reimbursement grants. Grant proposals requesting up to \$5,000 will be considered, for \$5,000 in matching funds.

A written report and presentation will be required in the year following the award outlining how the funds were spent, the progress of the project to date including impact on the community and plans for the future. Partnerships with grant awards will be required to provide information to be included in the NCP Global Mission Partnerships Directory, available for download on the NCP GMN webpage at https://thepresbytery.org/the-work-of-the-presbytery/committees/mission-coordination/global-mission-network

Proposals are due to NCP by email by **September 30, 2024** to Judith Dahmann (<u>jdahmann@mitre.org</u>) using the NCP standard application (download from <u>NCP Common</u> <u>Grants & Scholarships | National Capital Presbytery (thepresbytery.org)</u> and addressing specific questions for Global Partnership Grants (part 2).





THE SCENT OF BRIGHT LIGHT

Sarah's infertility is a heavy weight over her life. Her situation looks even more hopeless when she is trapped for years in the harem of an Egyptian Pharoah. Upon being freed, Pharoah gives Sarah a little girl who was born in the harem, named Ta-Sherit. The mysterious God who speaks to Sarah and her husband, Abraham, seems to have great power and has promised them a multitude of descendants. But Sarah is old and getting older, and still has not given birth.

In this novel, Sarah tells her story through the lens of her relationship with Ta-Sherit, whom she loves and raises like a daughter—while others nickname the Egyptian girl "Hagar" and view her as a servant. In this creative reimagining of an ancient family drama, the biblical text becomes a new story when it comes from Sarah in her own voice.
